

STATISTICAL BULLETIN 2005 - 2006

DISPLACED HOMEMAKER PROGRAMS

The North Carolina Council for Women distributes state funding to local county programs to be used for providing services to displaced homemakers. In 2005-2006, the Council distributed state funding to thirty-five displaced homemaker programs. The local programs provide job counseling, job training, job placement services, health education, counseling services, and financial management services to displaced homemakers.

- The displaced homemaker programs served 4,132 clients in 2004-2005. The 2005-2006 total represents a 34% increase in the number of clients served.
- The Wilkes county program served the highest number of clients at the local level (524) followed by Cumberland (505) and Wayne (456) counties.
- In 2005-2006, 48% of the clients served were white. Blacks comprised 38% of the clients while 8% of the clients were Hispanics.
- The 24-34 age groups comprised the largest group served by the local county programs.
- Single clients comprised 30% of the total number served.
- Women comprised 91% of the clients served in 2005-2006.
- Of the total number of clients served, 14% obtained full time employment while 11% obtained part time employment.
- Information/Referral and Follow-up services comprised the largest services provided by the local programs.
- Of the total number of clients served, 22% were placed in a four year college, community college, or trade course.
- Of the total number of clients that received an education placement, 66% were placed in a community college.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE PROGRAMS

The North Carolina Council for Women distributes state funding to local county programs for victims of domestic violence and to the North Carolina Coalition Against Domestic Violence which provides technical assistance to the programs. Funding is provided to domestic violence programs in all 100 North Carolina counties. Each local county program provides a 24-hour confidential crisis hotline, crisis intervention services, referrals to other community resources as needed, emergency shelter or shelter referral, advocacy, counseling, and community education.

- The domestic violence programs served 50,726 clients in 2004-2005. The 2005-2006 total represents a 5% decrease in the number of clients served.
- The Wake county program served the highest number of clients at the local level (2,680) followed by Buncombe (2,458) and Rockingham (1,626) counties.
- Whites comprised 55% of the total number of clients served by the local county programs. Blacks comprised 26% of the total number of clients served, while Hispanics accounted for 9%.
- In 2005-2006, 34% of the clients served were in the 45-54 age groups. The 35-44 age group comprised 20% of the total number of clients served.
- Women comprised 87% of the total number of clients served while men comprised 13%.
- A majority of services provided by the programs included distributing information to clients followed by referring the clients to other organizations for additional assistance.
- In 2004-2005, the local programs received 104,063 calls on the 24-hour crisis lines. In 2005-2006, 115,124 calls were received, representing an 11% increase in volume.
- In 2004-2005, 823 clients were referred to other shelters due to a lack of space. Referrals increased in 2005-2006 by 36%.

SEXUAL ASSAULT PROGRAMS

The North Carolina Council for Women distributes state funding to seventy-five local county programs for victims of sexual assault and to the North Carolina Coalition Against Sexual Assault which provides technical assistance to the local county programs. Each county program provides a 24-hour confidential crisis hotline, crisis intervention services, referrals to other community resources as needed, emergency shelter or shelter referral, advocacy, counseling and community education.

- In 2004-2005, the local county programs served 8,564 clients. The 2005-2006 total number of clients served represents a 2% increase in the total number clients served.
- The Buncombe county program served the highest number of clients at the local level (689) followed by Haywood (520) and Wake (449) counties.
- In 2005-2006, whites comprised 63% of the clients served while 21% were black.
- In 2005-2006, 25% of the clients served were in the 26-40 age groups.
- Women comprised 89% of the total number of clients served while men accounted for 11%.
- Of the total number of assaults, 22% were child sexual offenses. This is an 11% decrease compared to the 2004-2005 child sexual offenses (2,139) reported to the local county programs.
- A majority of clients were assaulted by either an acquaintance or relative while 14% of the clients served did not give this information to the local county program.
- In 2005-2006, 35% of the offenders were a relative of the victim while 29% were an acquaintance.
